The South Cortland Cemetery* by John Hoeschele

"There is something beautiful, intriguing, and intrinsically valuable about an old rural cemetery and the South Cortland Cemetery is no exception.

"Surrounded by a stone wall, shaded by 15 stately maple trees, and speckled with just under 100 siltstone and limestone headstones dating from 1808 to 1932. This remnant of 19th century upstate New York is all the more intriguing because like many inactive cemeteries in Cortland County and elsewhere in the Northeast, only partially documented.

Despite its shortage of formal documentation the physical site has been relatively well maintained by the town of Cortlandville and a handful of civic-minded volunteers. According to New York State law, the town must care for abandoned cemeteries in its jurisdiction.

According to a passage describing this hamlet in a document prepared for the Cortlandville Sesquicentennial in 1979 South Cortland had nearly two dozen houses, two small houses of worship, a store, a post office and 161 inhabitants (according to French's 1860 gazetteer, page 252).

The Dedication

We dedicate this marker to the memory of John Calvert who brought his family to this county 213 years ago.

The six children who came with him soon had over fifty children and so the Cortland Calvert's continued to increase through eight or nine generations.

We hope that his marker will remind them of their immigrant roots and the struggles of their ancestors to settle this new land.

John Calvert came to the Town of Virgil in 1800. He with the other settlers suffered great hardships and privations to covert the woods to productive farm land.

As we dedicate this marker we are reminded of others* who came to The Town of Virgil that same year as John Calvert. Among them were James Wright, Seth Larabee, John Ellis, Moses Rice, Abial Brown and Moses Stevens.

Greettings from Dr. Peter Calvert Eastleigh, Hampshire, England

It is a great pleasure to be able to send greetings from a descendant of the Calverts of Co Armagh on the occasion of the dedication of this memorial. Back in the 1950s I had found among my grandfather's papers a mysterious letter from a John B. Calvert of New York, but was able to make nothing of it until the arrival of the internet. Then, and only then, I was able to identify the author as the chronicler of the Cortland Calverts, Rev. John Betts Calvert. In the 1914 edition of Genealogy of The Calvert Family, Cortland, New York Branch, he wrote: "The Calverts who migrated from Yorkshire to Armagh and later to America and the Lord Baltimore Calverts were presumably of the same stock. There is a tradition among the Calverts of Cortland, New York, that the families sustained friendly relationship and exchanged visits in the mother country. The Calverts now living in Armagh and Dublin are children of John Calvert, who died in Armagh, November 19, 1873, lineal descendants of the Calverts of Yorkshire." This John Calvert (1795-1873), grocer, of Armagh City, was my grandfather's grandfather.

The founder of the Cortland Calverts, John Calvert, born about 1731, came to the United States from Co Armagh, Ireland, about 1792, with six children: John, Alexander, Robert, Margaret, Nathaniel and William. Only John and Nathaniel are known to have living descendants in the male line. After his death in 1808, which this memorial stone commemorates, another son, Thomas, the eldest, ,joined the family in New York State but later migrated to Illinois. "He stated in his naturalization [in 1831] that he was born in Tonnomorough, Down, Ireland and that was about 1767." This was the townland known today as Tannaghmore, Co Down [parish of Loughinisland, barony of Kinelarty], which directly adjoins Tannaghmore, Co Armagh [parish of Mullaghbrack, barony of Oneilland West]. Both are now part of Lurgan, Co Armagh, and it is doubtless from that area that John Calvert came.

"Greetings to Calvert descendants and relatives from Don Stone and other descendants of William Calvert, son of the immigrant John Calvert. William married Sarah Clark, daughter of Samuel Clark and Sarah McClung of Cayuga , Co. NY. (So far as I have been able to trace them, the ancestors of Samuel Clark ere Scots-Irish who came to Massachusetts in the 1700s, while Sarah McClung ancestors were Scots-Irish who came to Pennsylvania in the 1700s.)

William and Sarah Calvert moved from Cortland Co., NY to Crawford Co, PA. he had eight children, of who the second was my great-great-grandfather, Samuel Calvert, b. 18apri 815, d. 6 Feb, 1904. Samuel Calvert was a charter member of the Jamestown (PA) United Presbyterian church and was elected an elder when the congregation was organized on 28 Oct. 1853. He served over 50 years in the role (until his death).

We have no contact with current members of the three families of the Calvert immigrants: Robert, Alexander and Thomas.

The Family of John Calvert, Founder

John Calvert arrived in New York City in 1792 from County Armagh, Providence of Ulster, Ireland with six of his children. Unfortunately there is no record of his wife. For a time he and his family lived in Saratoga County, New York before settling in the Town of Virgil (then Onondaga County, New York) in 1800. He died in 1808 and was buried in the South Cortland Cemetery. It is believed that his was the first interment.

The record of the family has been partially preserved in The Calvert Reunion Book. It contains the earliest records that we have of family members in addition the minutes of annual reunions from 1901 to 1937. Since that time additional material has been published as follows: The Genealogy of the Calvert Family: Cortland, New York Branch by Dr. John Betts Calvert, 1914 and updated by Charles Crossman Calvert in 1960. Also: The Family Tree of Melancthon William Calvert, 1829-1894 and Mary Ann Lamont, 1829-1900 by Robert Harvey Calvert, 2012.
